

Conflict and Reciprocity in Architecture

Western architecture practice tends to suffer from a great dose of introspection. This lecture proposes a new framework for thinking about the discipline, which cuts through the discipline, which cuts through the long-standing divide between accounts of 'high-standard' and other kinds of architecture. Paulo Moreira is a Porto-based architect and researcher. He graduated from FAUP, having studied also at the Accademia di architettura di Mendrisio, and received his doctorate from London Metropolitan University. In 2011, founded paulo moreira architectures, a practice deeply engaged in working in contexts of urban conflict and social deprivation. His works have been presented in international conferences, publications and exhibitions, such as La Biennale di Venezia. He is the founder and artistic director of INSITUTO, a focal point for different forms of cultural expression, hosting exhibitions, publications, talks and workshops, as well as residencies for artists and architects, in Porto. With his work on informal communities in Angola, he was a finalist in the RIBA president's Award for Research 2019, Cities & Community category, and a recipient of the 2021 Grant to Individuals - Graham Foundation. Moreira edited 'Critical Neighbourhoods - The Architecture of Contested Communities' (Park Books, 2022)
